

### **Mandarin Community Club launches citrus fundraiser**

Since 1923, the Mandarin Community Club has served as a vital part of the Mandarin community, and with the public's help, the organization can sustain their mission for another century. Yet another industry integral to the Sunshine State needs help too -Florida Citrus. This year, the Mandarin Community Club is excited to partner with Florida Indian River Groves for a fundraiser that supports both the Mandarin Community Club's mission and Florida's storied citrus industry, with deep roots right here in Mandarin. From Sept. 1 to Nov. 14, the public can pre-order boxes of fresh, Florida-grown citrus, with pick-up at the Mandarin Community Club's Christmas Tree Lighting on Dec. 5.

#### 25,000 orange trees reported in 19thcentury Mandarin groves

Mandarin, Florida, named in 1830 for the variety of citrus commonly found in the area's thriving citrus groves, has a rich heritage that reflects the broader story of Florida's citrus industry. Spanish explorers, including Ponce de Leon,

introduced citrus to Florida in the 1500s, and by the 1700s, Florida Indians were cultivating seeds from Spanish missionaries. In Mandarin, the industry took hold in the 19th century. The banks of the St. Johns River were known to be favorable to orange groves; the soil was believed to give noteworthy flavor to the fruit, and the river helped protect from the occasional freezing winds. Figures like Harriet Beecher Stowe, who wintered here in the late 1800s following the Civil War, noted properties boasting groves yielding tens of thousands of oranges. An article in a Jacksonville newspaper, the "Daily Florida Union," carried a story on March 30, 1879 stating: "Twenty-five thousand orange trees are set out in groves between Beauclerc Bluff and the Mandarin Post-Office, an area of some 4 miles –

3,500 of these trees are bearing fruit..." the reporter concluded that the citrus industry in Mandarin "has been cited to show the unbeliever that Mandarin can and does grow oranges successfully." Today, Mandarin's commercial groves are largely gone, but backyard trees and small groves, like the one next to the Club's Harriet Beecher Stowe Pavilion remain, a testament to our citrus legacy.

### Florida's citrus production plummets by

Florida's citrus industry, once the heartbeat of the state's economy and identity, has faced unprecedented challenges. Over the past two decades, production has plummeted by 90 percent, dropping from 300 million boxes annually in the

early 2000s to a projected 12 million boxes of oranges for the 2024-25 season. Citrus greening disease, a bacterial infection spread by the Asian citrus psyllid, has infected nearly all of Florida's groves, reducing fruit production and yield. Devastating hurricanes, like Irma in 2017 and Ian in 2022, have caused hundreds of millions in damages, further weakening an already struggling industry. As a result, many growers have sold their land for development, and Florida, once the nation's top citrus producer, now trails behind California.

Yet, there's hope on the horizon. Innovative solutions are helping growers fight citrus greening, and the Florida Legislature has allocated nearly \$140 million to support research and recovery efforts, a record breaking investment set in the 2025 Legislative Session. By purchasing fresh, Florida-grown citrus during this fundraiser, residents are not just savoring the unmatched flavor of Sunshine State oranges, mandarins, and grapefruitsthey're helping preserve a vibrant part of Florida's heritage. Nothing beats the taste of Florida citrus, picked at its peak and bursting with flavor, grown right here in the state's groves.



### **Scholar to explore inspiration behind 'Uncle Tom's Cabin'**

The Mandarin Community Club proudly presents a compelling presentation by Dr. Susanna Ashton, author of "A Plausible Man: The True Story of the Escaped Slave Who Inspired Uncle Tom's

Cabin." This event will illuminate the life of John Andrew Jackson, a fugitive slave whose brief stay in Harriet Beecher Stowe's home in 1850 likely inspired her iconic novel, "Uncle Tom's Cabin," which galvanized the abolitionist movement and reshaped American history.


The event will take place on Friday, Sept. 19, at the historic Mandarin Community Club, 12447 Mandarin Road, with doors opening at 6 p.m. for a reception hosted by the Mandarin Museum & Historical Society, offering a beer and wine bar alongside a selection of savory and sweet hors d'oeuvres, followed by Dr. Ashton's presentation at 7 p.m.

Dr. Ashton, a professor of English at Clemson University, is a distinguished scholar of slavery and freedom narratives, with her work featured in The New York Times, CNN, The Wall Street Journal, The Smithsonian, and The New Republic. Renowned for her engaging and humorous presentations, she weaves insightful storytelling to captivate audiences. Her notable achievements include a W.E.B. DuBois Fellowship at Harvard, a Fulbright to Ireland, and a fellowship at Yale's Gilder Lehrman Center.

In "A Plausible Man" (The New Press, 2024), Ashton meticulously traces Jackson's journey from slavery to freedom, his fight to liberate his family, and his role as an international advocate for abolition, set against the backdrop of the Civil War and the country's Reconstruction era.

This event carries significance in Mandarin, where Harriet Beecher Stowe spent winters after the Civil War, penning essays and sketches about Florida life that reflected her connection to the South's complex post-war landscape.

Susie Scott, past president of the Mandarin Community Club and member



of the Club's events committee, who championed this event, shared her inspiration: "I was inspired to bring this literary exploration of Stowe's worldchanging 'Uncle Tom's Cabin' to our community, where she lived for many years. After reading a book review, I became eager to share this story."


Scott added, "Stowe's work profoundly shaped her era and beyond, and this book offers a fascinating glimpse into how a single character may have sparked her transformative writing."



Julia Short

For Julia Short, Mandarin isn't just home - it's a legacy spanning seven generations of Florida history. As a lifelong resident, Short embodies the deep community roots that make Mandarin special.

"I'm a seventh generation Floridian, which blows people's minds because they say, 'well, what was here seven generations ago, other than like swamp and cows?" Short explains. Her family descends from Florida crackers who built their homes with their own hands using surrounding trees. A proud graduate of Mandarin High School, Short continued her education at Florida State University.

Julia Cuthbertson Short's connection to her hometown runs so deep that when she met her husband during her freshman year at Florida State University, she made her intentions clear from the start.

"The moment my tassel turns, I'm going back to Mandarin," she told him. The couple eventually planned a small, intimate ceremony in her parents' living room, followed by dinner under string lights in the backyard. Fortunately, her Orlando-born husband fell in love with Mandarin's small-town feel, historic trees, and most importantly, its people.

Short's love for community and history naturally drew her to the Mandarin Community Club, where she now

serves as a volunteer board member on the fundraising team. Founded in 1923, the independent nonprofit organization is dedicated to preserving and beautifying Mandarin while maintaining three historic properties that tell the area's story.

The properties include the old schoolhouse, which has served as both church and school throughout its century-plus existence, and the original post office and general store along Mandarin Road.

"When I saw those buildings in middle school, I thought they're just gorgeous. They're in their original state – it's just incredible," Short recalls.

Short's professional background in fundraising serves her well in her volunteer role, where she naturally gravitated toward asking for support. "I was always the person on my sports teams or my school clubs that was kind of pushed to the front to do the asking when we would do our fundraisers," she recalls.

The Community Club keeps Short busy year-round with events that bring neighbors together. Their largest fundraiser, an art festival running since the 1960s, takes place on Easter weekend. This fall, they're partnering with a Florida citrus grove for an online fundraiser.

But it's Short's passion for local history that truly sets her apart. She's read local architectural histories multiple times and serves as a graduate of the Leadership Jacksonville Next Generation program.

"We have a wonderful opportunity to embolden the stories of our historic neighborhoods and bring them with us to our next chapter of what our city can be," Short reflects. "I have a staunch belief that we each have a responsibility to give to our communities."

With Mandarin approaching its bicentennial in 2030, Short and the Community Club are already looking ahead to celebrate two centuries of history. As someone whose family helped write that history, she's perfectly positioned to help preserve it for future generations.

For Julia Short, preserving the past while building community for the future isn't just volunteer work - it's a calling rooted in seven generations of Florida soil.



### Blue Ridge Bliss: A journey through Southwest Virginia

The call of the Blue Ridge Parkway, often called "America's Favorite Drive," is hard to ignore. I recently followed that call into the heart of Southwest Virginia. The road is limited-access, billboard-free and designed for leisurely travel rather than high-speed driving.

I found scenic overlooks with layered ridgelines of misty blue and uncovered a string of small towns: Rocky Mount, Stuart and Floyd. Each one a gem in its own right, welcomed me with music, stories and now, memories that linger.

My trip began near Rocky Mount, a friendly spot with deep agricultural roots and the proud title of "Moonshine Capital of the World." That evening, I sipped a moonshine cocktail and tapped my foot to the beat of old-time mountain music at Twin Creeks Distillery. Think banjo picking, fast fiddling, guitar and upright bass—the soundtrack of Appalachia.

Just outside town, I found the Blue Ridge Institute and Farm Museum in Ferrum. As Virginia's official state center for folklore, it maintains a farmstead and exhibits on Appalachian traditions. I meandered through preserved 19thcentury buildings, photographing rustic barns, weathered tools and heritage breeds of livestock.

Farther south along the Parkway, I pulled over at the Rocky Knob Recreation Area, where I found opportunities for hiking, biking and camping. But I couldn't resist stopping at the Saddle Overlook. It offered the opposite of Florida's landscape—mighty mountain ridges rolling across the horizon. I loved it.

A bit farther on, I reached one of the Parkway's most photographed landmarks: Mabry Mill. The weathered wooden gristmill, reflected in the still water, created a timeless scene. On weekends, local musicians gather there, adding an Appalachian soundtrack through the trees. Visitors can also watch demonstrations of traditional crafts like blacksmithing, sawmilling and sorghum-making.

I then made my way to Stuart for a stop at Fairy Stone State Park. Legend says the park's cross-shaped stones were formed from the tears of mourning fairies. While I didn't find any fairy stones, I discovered plenty of magic in the park's peaceful woodland.

But the real soul of this trip revealed itself in Floyd. Just a few miles off the Parkway, Floyd is a place where art, music and mountain spirit mingle on every corner. My visit coincided with the Thursday Night Jam, nearly as lively as the legendary Friday Night Jamboree at the Floyd Country Store. Locals and visitors pack the space, clapping and dancing. Joy abounds. I adored watching the fiddlers, twirling dancers and grinning elders tapping their toes.

By day, the Floyd Artisan Trail led me to tucked-away galleries and studios brimming with pottery, paintings and fine woodworking. The Hotel Floyd made an ideal overnight rest stop.

My final Parkway stop, near the North Carolina border, brought me to the Blue Ridge Music Center. Managed by the National Park Service, the museum tells the story of mountain music's deep roots. Out back, a shaded amphitheater hosts musicians who keep those tunes alive—melodies that rise from the hills.

October brings the most visitors to the Parkway, thanks to its explosion of fall color. Last year, I detoured there (while visiting Natural Bridge) just to catch the autumn display. All I can say is wow! Make your reservations soon.

My journey along the Blue Ridge Parkway reminded me that travel isn't always about ticking off landmarks; it's about pausing, observing and connecting. In Southwest Virginia, I found a place where the past is preserved with pride, the music never fades and the beauty begs to be relished. For anyone seeking an authentic slice of Appalachian culture, this route delivers.

### **Cooler waters mean active fish**

We are on the downhill run now. Although it may be very hot out still, our Fall transition is in full swing. When water temperatures go from the low 90s to mid-80s with a Northeast wind here and there, the fish take notice. The main reason is because the food is leaving. Most of the shrimp, mullet, and various other bait fish that have grown up in the river throughout the year are starting to move out to begin the next stages of their lives. The predators take the hint, gorging as they follow them on their way out.

Hopefully the shrimp have returned. They disappeared last month after what was the best early run of shrimp I can remember. We went from catching 100 per cast to catching none two

weeks later. That's weird. Especially when there's no major storm event tied to it. If they stay scarce I'd still expect fishing to improve since when they were here in good numbers the fishing was a little slow.

The mullet run is also going on, so if you enjoy surf fishing it's a good time to be on the sand. It's a great show if nothing else. Just about every evening somewhere along the beach you will see lots of activity as the mullet travel south. Tarpon, sharks, jacks, etc, will be hot on their tails. We have mullet exiting the river too, but it's hard to find them concentrated like they are in the surf. The run doesn't last nearly as long either. Bridges, inlets, and jetties

I would expect fishing for just about every fish species we have been chasing this summer to be improving. Redfish will be hunting the shallows early and late looking for mullet, shrimp, and whatever else they can find. Sheepshead would love some smaller shrimp around the dock and bridge pilings. Flounder are lurking on shell bars and drop offs waiting for bait to go by. Stripers should be going crazy now that the water temperatures are finally dropping and they can feel a little more comfortable chasing shrimp.

It is time to reenergize and break out of the summer doldrums. The fish are here but they won't be for too much longer so go find them. Tight lines. National Poison cont. from pg. 7

### In the heat, small steps make gardening rewarding

While the August weather has been brutal, and it will probably continue into September, it's advisable to take it easy. But weeds and our favorite plants have all been growing apace since summer rains began. During heat advisories I find it's just bearable to be out early and my plants have benefited from some grooming here and there. That and a short weeding session, and it's satisfying to have done something useful despite the

Major work needs to be delayed until autumn, so now is the ideal time to dream and plan. The resources we have available through the Uf/IFAS Florida Friendly landscaping program merit a look. The presenters are all experts in their fields and the information they share is rock solid. If you prefer to read to become informed, you can find design ideas, plant suggestions and articles on a host of other topics.

I've long been aware of color variations in flowers like blanket flower (Gaillardia sp.), and it's been brought into focus now that my delightful, dotted horsemint (Monarda punctata) plants are blooming.

My Shumard oak (Quercus shumardii) had some unusual twig dieback recently. Concerned that it could be serious, I contacted our Uf/IFAS Florida Extension specialist, Larry

Figart, for advice. He immediately knew the likely cause, as this year the problem has been more prevalent than usual, and I was able to determine that the culprit is indeed a small black twig boring beetle. It lays its eggs inside small twigs and stems, boring a tiny hole on the underside of a twig, which is visible with a good hand lens. If you have any affected plants, prune back to healthy wood or stems and destroy the infected material.
